

Mild amount of plaque Gums are mildly red

Stage II

Moderate amount of plaque Redness and swelling of the gums


Tartar is present

Heavy tartar Severe inflammation of the gums Evidence of infection or tooth








Stage III or IV need veterinary care as soon as possible


♦Pain management
