#### **Vet Adventure Moves**

**Build:** Make the story longer by placing your card at the beginning or end.


**Branch:** Add a side story by placing your card next to another card.

**Break:** Insert a card in between 2 cards that have already been played.



Balling Gun (Bawl-ing Gun): Balling Guns are used to help cows swallow big pills like medicine or vitamins.




Bandages (Ban-did-jiz): Bandages are used to cover and protect places that have gotten hurt like cuts or scrapes.




Bandage Scissors (Ban-didj Sizzrs): Bandage Scissors are special scissors used to cut bandages.



Computer (Kum-pew-ter): Computers are used to keep and see medical records and other information.



ECG (EEE-CEE-GEE): An electrocardiogram, or ECG for short, is used to detect problems with the heart.




Endoscope (N-doe-skope): Endoscopes are tools with cameras used to see inside the body.



Endotracheal Tube (N-doe-tray-key-ill Toob): Endotracheal Tubes are used to help animals breathe. They are placed in an animal's windpipe during an operation or in emergencies when an animal is having trouble breathing.



Gloves (Gluhvz): Gloves can protect hands from harmful things like germs. Remember to wash your hands after taking your gloves off.



Halter (Hall-terr): Halters are used to help lead or hold an animal. The halter goes over the animal's head. A rope attaches to the halter.




Isolation (Eye-sew-lay-shun): Isolation is keeping a patient alone so they cannot spread germs or diseases.



Hoof Trimmers (Who-ff Trim-ers): Hoof Trimmers are used like nail clippers to keep hooves at a comfortable length.



Horse Dental Float (Hors Den-tel Flowt): Horse Dental Floats are used to file off sharp points or edges on horses' teeth.



Fluids (Flew-ids): Fluids are given to animals that are dehydrated or cannot drink on their own.



Surgical Mask (Sir-jih-kull Mask): Surgeons wear masks to prevent mouth and nose germs from spreading during surgery.



Medicine (Med-ih-sin): Medicine is used to treat animals that are sick.



Microscope (My-crow-skope): Microscopes are like magnifying glasses. Microscopes make tiny things bigger so you can see them with your eyes.



Needle Holders (Knee-dull Hole-ders): Surgeons use Needle Holders to guide the needle when they are sewing things back together.



Otoscope (Oh-toe-skope): Otoscopes are used to look inside ears.



Ophthalmoscope (Opp-thall-mo-skope): Ophthalmoscopes are used to look inside eyes.



Radiograph (Ray-dee-oh-graff): Radiographs are pictures of the inside of the body made with x-rays.



Scrub Brush (Skrub Bruh-sh): Surgeons use Scrub Brushes to get their hands and fingernails super clean before operating.



Scale (Skail): Scales are used to weigh animals.




### **How to Play**


- 1. Play alone or with friends.

Stethoscope (Steh-thoh-skope): Stethoscopes are used to listen to heart beats, breathing or gut sounds.



Suture (Suu-churr): Suture is a special thread that doctors use to make stitches when sewing things back together.



Test Tubes (Tehst Toobz): Test Tubes are used to hold samples of things collected from inside of animals like blood or urine, until the samples can be examined in a laboratory.



Thermometer (Thur-mom-meh-turr): Thermometers are used to take an animal's temperature.




Ultrasound (Uhll-truh-sownd): Ultrasound machines are used to look inside an animal's body.



Water Test Kit (Wah-terr Tehst Kit): Water Test Kits are used to see if the water that fish live in is clean and safe.



Surgery (Sir-jur-ee): An operation during which human and animal doctors called surgeons use tools to treat injuries or diseases.



Temperature (Tem-per-ah-tur): Temperature is the degree of hotness or coldness of something.



Shelter (Shell-turr): Shelter is a place that covers and protects animals and people.



Nutrition (New-trih-shun): Nutrition is the process by which an animal uses food to stay healthy.



Water (Wah-terr): Water is a liquid that is a major part of living things.



Blood Transfusion (Blud Tranz-few-shun): Blood Transfusion is the process of taking blood from a healthy donor animal and putting it inside another animal that needs blood.



Physical Exam (Fizz-ick-el X-am): Physical Exam is a health check where body parts are examined to see if there are any problems.



Feces (Fee-sees) and Urine (Your-in): Feces and Urine are solid and liquid wastes eliminated from the body.



Cast (Kast): A Cast is a form placed around an area to protect the area while it heals.



Splint (Spul-int): A Splint is stiff material used to protect a body part and keep it in place.



Rest (Resst): Rest is a state of no activity.



Asthma Inhaler (Az-ma In-hale-ur): An Asthma Inhaler is a device used to inhale medicines through the mouth or nose.



Vaccine (Vax-een): Vaccines are given to increase protection against getting a disease.



Dental Exam (Den-tel X-am): A dental visit is with a special doctor called a dentist who examines the teeth and mouth.



E-Collar (Eee Call-ur): E-Collar is a stiff cone placed around an animal's neck so it can't bite, lick or scratch body parts that are healing.



Diagnostic Testing (Die-ag-noss-tick Tesst-ing): Diagnostic Testing is testing to identify the cause of an illness.
